



Rhode Island's Unemployment Rate Drops to 10.9 percent in June

- ◆ RI's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for June was 10.9 percent, down one-tenth of a percentage point from May.
- ◆ RI's June unemployment rate down half of a percentage point from last June's figure of 11.4 percent.
- ◆ The national rate was 8.2 percent, unchanged from May and down nine-tenths of a percentage point from the previous year.
- ◆ In June 2012, Rhode Island had the 2nd highest unemployment rate in the nation, trailing Nevada (11.6%).
- ◆ The June 2012 unemployment rate increased in twenty-seven states, including Connecticut (+0.3), Vermont (+0.1), New Hampshire (+0.1) and Maine (+0.1). Eleven states, including Rhode Island (-0.1), saw their rates decrease, while twelve states' rates, including Massachusetts, were unchanged. In all, three states have unemployment rates in the double digits.
- ◆ Rates in other New England States for June 2012—Connecticut 8.1 percent, Maine 7.5 percent, Massachusetts 6.0 percent, New Hampshire 5.1 percent and Vermont 4.7 percent.
- ◆ The number of employed RI residents totaled 495,000 in June 2012, down 400 from the previous month. Between June 2011 and June 2012, the number of employed RI residents decreased by 4,500.
- ◆ Over the month, the number of unemployed Rhode Island residents decreased by 1,100 to 60,300 in June 2012. From June 2011 to June 2012, the number of unemployed residents decreased by 3,700.

Private Employment by Size of Firm March 2012

The Rhode Island economy is characterized by a large number of small companies employing a small number of workers. In March 2012, there were 31,694 firms employing 383,177 workers.

Nearly half the employers (49.5%) in the state have between one and four employees; however, they employ just 7.7 percent of the workforce. The largest employers, those with 1,000 or more employees, numbered 30 (0.1%) and employed 16.6 percent of Rhode Island's private sector workforce.

- ◆ Smaller employers, those with less than 20 employees, represented 90.0 percent of all employers in the state and employed approximately one quarter (24.8%) of the workforce.
- ◆ Mid-sized companies (20 to 99 workers) employed 27.1 percent of the private sector employment and accounted for 8.2 percent of the firms.

- ◆ There are just 558 (1.8%) businesses in the state employing 100 or more workers. Together, they employ nearly half (48.1%) of the state's private sector employees.

Rhode Island Jobs Decrease by 900 in June

Estimated nonfarm payroll in Rhode Island totaled 457,100 in June, reflecting a loss of 900 jobs from the revised May employment estimate of 458,000. The June employment figure marks the lowest employment estimate since November 2009 (457,000).

The Retail Trade sector lost 600 jobs in June due to in part to reported employment losses in motor vehicle and parts dealers and building material supply dealers. The Professional & Business Services sector reported a loss of 500 positions, with job declines in professional services, employment services and waste services.

Also, the Government sector shed 300 jobs in June, followed by a loss of 200 jobs in the Financial Activities, Information and Wholesale Trade sectors, and losses of 100 jobs each in the Accommodation & Food Services, Educational Services and Arts, Entertainment & Recreation sectors.

Helping to offset the job declines, the Other Services sector added 800 jobs over the month, with employment gains in repair and maintenance services and civic and social organizations. Positive job gains were also reported in Manufacturing (+400), due to an increase in durable goods employment, and in Construction (+200), due to an increase in specialty trades employment. Employment in the Health Care & Social Assistance, Transportation & Utilities and Mining & Logging sectors remained unchanged over the month.

Over the year, total nonfarm employment decreased by 3,900. Job losses were reported in eight economic sectors, including Retail Trade (-2,000), Health Care & Social Assistance (-1,700), Government (-700), Accommodation & Food Services (-600), Financial Activities (-400), Arts, Entertainment & Recreation (-400), Professional & Business Services (-100) and Other Services (-100).

Educational Services employment posted the largest over-the-year increase in June, with a gain of 1,100 jobs, followed by Manufacturing (+600), Wholesale Trade (+200), and Construction (+200).

Employment in Information, Transportation & Utilities and Mining & Logging remained unchanged over the year.

MANUFACTURING: In June 2012, production workers in the Manufacturing sector earned \$18.23 per hour. The average hourly production wage remained unchanged from May 2012 and up \$2.24 from June 2011. Manufacturing employees worked an average of 40.5 hours per week in June, up seven-tenths of an hour over the month and up an hour and one-tenth from a year ago.

The employment figures in this section are derived from a survey of businesses in Rhode Island and measure the number of jobs in the state. Not seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment data is available at: www.dlt.ri.gov/lmi/ces.htm.

New Data Shows Growth in RI Jobs



Based on its analysis of employment data available from quarterly Unemployment Insurance tax reports submitted by all RI employers, the RI Department of Labor and Training (DLT) estimates that the number of jobs at RI businesses grew by 1.0 percent between March 2011 and March 2012. Earlier estimates, produced by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), which are based on a sample of RI employers reported a job loss 0.5 percent for the March 2011 to March 2012 period.

The DLT analysis estimates the number of RI based seasonally adjusted payroll jobs at 464,700, which is 7,000 more than the official BLS payroll job count of 457,700 as published in April 2012. This means that instead of the previously reported loss of 2,200 jobs from March 2011 to March 2012, RI employers actually added 4,800 jobs over that period.

According to the DLT analysis, the private sector added 6,000 jobs over the year with the largest gains occurring in Professional & Business Services (+1,800), Accommodation & Food Services (+1,800) and Construction (+1,200). The analysis also shows that Government employment is down 1,200 over the year due mainly to losses at the local level.

As noted, the revised payroll employment is based on the quarterly Unemployment Insurance tax reports submitted by **all 32,000 employers** that are covered by the Unemployment Insurance program. The official BLS estimates are based on employment changes reported by a **sample of some 1,600 RI employers**. The DLT analysis provides a preview of the expected revisions to the official monthly job numbers which will be released in March 2013 after the BLS annual benchmark revision process is completed early next year. Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed

A total of 12,817 individuals were eligible to collect “regular” Unemployment Insurance benefits in June 2012, down 1,015 (-7.3%) from the 13,832 collecting these benefits in June 2011. In addition, 9,989 individuals collected Emergency Unemployment Compensation and 1,694 collected Extended Benefits. In all, 44.4 percent of Rhode Island’s unemployed workers were eligible to collect unemployment benefits in June.

Of the 12,817 individuals collecting “regular” Unemployment Insurance benefits, 31.7 percent faced long-term unemployment (defined as collecting unemployment insurance for fifteen weeks or more), down from 33.9 percent in June 2011.

On an industry basis, 14.6 percent (1,867) of the State’s insured unemployed workers came from the Health Care & Social Assistance sector. There were also 1,505 individuals with an attachment to the Manufacturing sector, accounting for 11.7 percent of all insured unemployed workers. An additional 11.2 percent (1,431) of those collecting UI benefits in June had worked in the Construction sector. Large numbers of insured unemployed were also reported in Retail Trade (1,352), Administrative & Waste Services (1,247) and Accommodation & Food Services (1,133). Employer Demand for Workers in Rhode Island

The *Conference Board Help Wanted OnLine* (HWOL) data series reported that there were 18,900 advertisements for Rhode Island based jobs this month, an increase of 800 (+4.2%) from the May 2012 postings, and up 1,500 (+7.9%) from the advertised vacancies posted online in June 2011. There were an estimated 3.40 advertised vacancies for every 100 persons in Rhode Island's labor force.

Nationally, there were an estimated 3.19 advertised vacancies for every 100 persons in labor force. Among the New England states, Massachusetts (4.23), Vermont (3.66), New Hampshire (3.57) and Connecticut (3.43) all had a higher vacancy rate than Rhode Island.

There were an estimated 3.19 unemployed Rhode Island residents for every advertised job in June, down from 3.40 unemployed residents estimated per May advertisements. Nationally, there were 2.58 unemployed persons for every job opening advertised in June, down from 2.70 in May.
